#### Hot Off The Press:

#### AMEB Accordion Syllabi update

I have just spoken to Bernard Depasquale, Manager AMEB Federal, about the review of the Accordion syllabi and unfortunately things are not looking very positive due to the dwindling numbers in candidates sitting for accordion exams. For example, there were apparently only three candidates who sat for exams in 2010 and I examined all three. Bernard advised that it may be risky to actually put the accordion syllabi up to the AMEB Board for review due to the extremely low candidate numbers. The reason being, if the accordion syllabi are not producing enough revenue for the AMEB, they could be deemed non profitable and hence be withdrawn altogether.

I have proposed to him a solution of own choice pieces for lists A to D which would need to be submitted by teachers to the AMEB approval for every candidate. This process would of course have a resource impact on the AMEB for approvals. He is considering this option and is having a look at Elizabeth's proposed Accordion Syllabi which were submitted to the AMEB back in 2005. Unfortunately, they were never approved by the AMEB Board at the time and still haven't been to date.

In the mean time, it is of utmost importance that all accordion teachers Australia wide enroll as many students for accordion exams as possible, otherwise we may very well face the inevitable of having the accordion syllabi being withdrawn altogether. This would be a terrible tragedy for the whole Australian accordion community. Your support and assistance in this regard would be very much appreciated.

#### CORDI'S COLUMN

The other week as I was looking through some archival material for ideas for this column I came across an article in the 'Music Forum' – journal of the Joint Council of NSW Music Organisations and dated January 1982. The articled titled "The English Concertina – Squeeze Box or …?" by Alex Richards is about the history of the instrument and how in its heyday it was accepted orchestrally. Today it is a largely forgotten art. It begins:- "It would be hard to imagine Tchaikovsky, Rossini and some other serious composers of the years 1860 to 1930 spending time writing for the boxmouthorgans of our bush bands and shearing sheds. But these composers wrote for the English Concertina"

Orchestras of the 19th century in Italy and England included the English Concertina in their repertoires. The instrument was invented by the physicist Charles Wheatstone

in 1827. Remodelled in the 1860s and by the 1920s reached a high standard of perfection and is claimed to be the only musical instrument originating in England. It is a compact, fully chromatic free reed instrument with a range of three and a half to five and a quarter octaves depending on the model. It was powered by bellows and could be played standing up or seated with the instrument resting on one knee. The full range of models from soprano to contra bass was designed to cover the entire compass of the orchestra. Individual instruments can cope with anything written for their orchestra counterparts. Concertina players could perform whatever music was written be it simple or involved. It is said the best instruments were built to give two hundred years of service with minimum maintenance. The treble concertina with 48 keys is adapted for fast and brilliant playing and has a virtuoso capacity in the fields of concerto, harmony and accompaniment. The tenor concertina 56 or 64 keys is especially suited to majestic harmonies. The baritone concertina of 48 keys has reeds larger and heavier than the other models lends itself to accompaniment work in particular.



I remember my Grandfather playing the concertina when I was a child!

#### A SHORT HISTORY OF ASA (cont)

Congress 2002 received reports from NSW and Victorian Divisions. Tony Andrios reported on the activities of the AMEB. The accordion syllabus is now separate from the main syllabus and is available on line. Eventually all instruments syllabuses will be separate and on line. Some music which was thought to be out of publication is now available on line. A new search engine is being developed by Harley Jones via www. accordions.com with Deffner and Berben publications on line. Following on from this it was noted that the ASA library was being reorganized and catalogued. The Victorian report was presented. At this time Victoria did not have a President or formal committee. Ian Southwood was acting as chairperson. Since the last congress the Bavarian Youth Orchestra had performed in Melbourne, James Crabb(accordionist) and Bollette Roed(recorder) had performed with the Australian Chamber Orchestra and as a duo at other venues in Melbourne. It was anticipated that a general meeting should be held as soon as possible to form a committee and generally organizing more involvement. Not having an orchestra limits contacts. Rob Scott-Mitchell presented the Accordion Review report and again urged more input from various States and individuals. The man hours involved were many. This was endorsed by June Jones and John Cras who see to the actual photocopying, folding, stapling and posting the magazine, as well as contributing. The satisfaction obtained from the completion of each. magazine was very rewarding. The idea of fundraising had taken hold and the co-musical directors' report gave

the dates for the Accordion Orchestra competition in Innsbruck Austria as June 10-13 2004. At present the orchestra consists of members from NSW Division; but members from affiliated groups (eg New Zealand) and other States in Australia will be welcome to join the orchestra. In her report Federal President expanded on the visit of James Crabb and Bollette Roed, who had a successful trip to Sydney and the Eastern coast of Australia. James' concert with the Australian Chamber Orchestra was well received by the public and his debut of Elena Kats-Chernin's work for Accordion, Piano and small chamber group Torque was great. The planned AMEB workshop did not eventuate due to lack of interest by the AMEB. The NSW Division hosted a successful concert/workshop in Haberfield on a Monday night in place of the usual orchestra rehearsal. It was good to have the opportunity to hear such talented performers.

A new category was implemented at this year's Festival. The suggestion came from Chelsey Mayes a young member from NZ: new ages classes for up to one years playing. A bid to attract younger players.

The visiting orchestra this year was the Reunion Philharmonic Accordeon Orchestra. The orchestra and individual members made a great contribution to the competition part of the Festival. This was a Festival with many highlights. It was certainly an educational experience to see 20 accordions combined with brass and woodwind instruments. Grant 'Yogi' Martin (Qld.) presented an enjoyable workshop which appealed to young and old alike. The culmination of the week was the Gala concert at Club Marconi to an audience of over 400 people. The combined orchestra performed beautifully as did the other performers. The list included the Reunion Island Philharmonic Orchestra, Ross Maio, 'Yogi', Elizabeth Jones, June and Gary Stratton (NZ) ACE (NSW) and Noteable Soundz (NZ). A great night was had by all!

The Presentation Dinner was followed by impromptu performances by June and Gary Stratton, Lorraine Parnell and the great Enzo Toppano.

After the Festival the Reunion Islands Orchestra went to Armidale to perform several concerts. They travelled by coach escorted by Alan and Elizabeth Jones. It was certainly a very busy time for promoting the accordion.

Categories for age competitions had altered in 2001 to bring them into line with other international categories. This had been trialled in 2001 and in time for 2002 the perpetual trophies had new plaques made to reflect this – but still retaining the original trophies.

The Accordion Review published in September 2002 has a number of worthwhile stories and accounts of the Festival week, which attest to just how successful this Festival had been.

Victoria also suffered from nature's disasters, but I am hoping for some info as life returns to 'normal'.

#### BIOGRAPHY OF THE PRESENT AUSTRALASIAN CHAMPION - BIN LU.

Bin Lu was born in China in 1991 and, influenced by his cousin, became interested in music and the piano accordion while in kindergarten at the age of five in TaiYuan JinShan art school. With the support of his parents, Bin's talent with the accordion developed during his early school years. In 2004, Bin progressed from the 120 Standard Bass to the Free-Bass Button Accordion and in 2006 won Gold and Bronze awards in

the Junior Class at the Beijing National Accordion Festival. Following this Bin was invited to perform in ShanXi province at the 8th disabled sports opening ceremony(TV alive). He achieved Excellent in the Chinese musicians association 10th. grade (highest grade) in 2008.

Bin moved to Australia in early 2009 as a Year 11 student at the Northern Beaches Secondary College, Freshwater Senior Campus and continued his music studies with support from his school music teacher, Mr Hasan Shanal, who frequently provided Bin with a lot of opportunities to show on the stage in the school assemblies. Bin also commenced advanced private tuition with Mr Zeljko Bedic, a highly regarded Sydney music teacher, examiner and accordion specialist. Under Mr Bedic's guidance and encouragement, Bin's achievements have risen to new heights having won the following top-level championships in 2010:
