NEWS FROM NEW ZEALAND

DARGAVILLE MUSEUM 'WAKEFIELD TO MASEFIELD' Sunday 25th March

Kevin Friedrich is curating a display at the Dargaville Museum to celebrate 40 years of the NZAA. This display, originally intended to be in June 2011, was postponed to hold a display unable to return to a Christchurch Museum.

Dargaville Museum Exhibition 'Wakefield to Masefield' Excerpt from The History of the Accordion in New Zealand by Wallace Liggett

We would not expect accordions to be mentioned in any early colonial literature of NZ, especially as NZ is halfway around the world from the centres of accordion development. However a reference does exist in the journal of Edward Jerningham Wakefield, one of the earliest English colonists, and his entry from the 24th of September 1839 contains an amusing reference to his use of an accordion.

"One named Te Kaera diverted us much by....bringing a long pointed spear within inches of our bodies: then retreating with a roar of laughter every time he saw us shrink from the thrust.....I repaid him his surprise the first day that he came on board. I had got an accordion under a large cloak, and kept time to its notes with my mouth, so as to deceive him and twenty other natives into the idea that I was uttering the various sounds. They showed a profound respect for my oratorical talents, until I let them find out the trick, a day or two afterwards. The accordion in question was called my mouth for a long time afterwards" (From Adventure in New Zealand by Edward Jerningham Wakefield. Edited by Joan Stevens, published by Golden Press 1975. The original version was published in 1845).

Ed: This is the first documented playing of an accordion in New Zealand and the Museum Display takes its name from here to Grayson Masefield winning the World Championship in New Zealand in 2009.

Music training has biological impact on aging process'

is reproduced here from the US-based news website Science Daily (Jan. 30, 2012).

Age-related delays in neural timing are not inevitable and can be avoided or offset with musical training, according to a new study from Northwestern University. The study is the first to provide biological evidence that lifelong musical experience has an impact on the aging process.

Measuring the automatic brain responses of younger and older musicians and non-musicians to speech sounds, researchers in the Auditory Neuroscience Laboratory discovered that older musicians had a distinct neural timing advantage.

"The older musicians not only outperformed their older non-musician counterparts, they encoded the sound stimuli as quickly and accurately as the younger non-musicians," said Northwestern neuroscientist Nina Kraus. "This reinforces the idea that how we actively experience sound over the course of our lives has a profound effect on how our nervous system functions."

Kraus, professor of communication sciences in the School of Communication and professor of neurobiology and physiology in the Weinberg College of Arts and Sciences, is co-author of "Musical experience offsets agerelated delays in neural timing" published online in the journal Neurobiology of Aging.

"These are very interesting and important findings," said Don Caspary, a nationally known researcher on age-related hearing loss at Southern Illinois University School of Medicine. "They support the idea that the brain can be trained to overcome, in part, some age-related hearing loss."

"The new Northwestern data, with recent animal data from Michael Merzenich and his colleagues at University of California, San Francisco, strongly suggest that intensive training even late in life could improve speech processing in older adults and, as a result, improve their ability to communicate in complex, noisy acoustic environments," Caspary added.

Previous studies from Kraus' Auditory Neuroscience Laboratory suggest that musical training also offset losses in memory and difficulties hearing speech in noise -- two common complaints of older adults. The lab has been extensively studying the effects of musical experience on brain plasticity across the life span in normal and clinical populations, and in educational settings.

However, Kraus warns that the current study's findings were not pervasive and do not demonstrate that musician's have a neural timing advantage in every neural response to sound. "Instead, this study showed that musical experience selectively affected the timing of sound elements that are important in distinguishing one consonant from another."

The automatic neural responses to speech sounds delivered to 87 normalhearing, native English-speaking adults were measured as they watched a captioned video. "Musician" participants began musical training before age 9 and engaged consistently in musical activities through their lives, while "non-musicians" had three years or less of musical training.

TONI'S LAST GIG

Toni Savage's funeral was held at the Davis Funeral Chapel, 150 Central Park Drive, Henderson on Wednesday 4th January 2012 at 1.30pm. It was a celebration of Toni's life and in accordance with her wishes was not a gloomy affair! Heather Masefield spoke for the NZAA, reading an excerpt from the History of the Accordion in New Zealand.

TONI SAVAGE BEM QSM

Toni Savage was awarded the British Empire Medal in 1969 and the Queen's Service Medal in 1982 in recognition of her services in entertaining, fundraising and supporting many charitable organisations. She also received the Benny Award in 1985, and has earned many other rewards over the years for entertaining the elderly, those in hospitals and other institutions, as well as playing in concert parties for members of the armed forces.

Born in England, Toni took piano lessons for one year before coming to NZ with her parents in 1929. She can recall seeing some accordions in a shop window in Auckland and showing so much interest when she first heard one, that she missed the supper at a party to spend time questioning the accordionist and trying his instrument. Then twelve years old, Toni invited him to her home and secured further use of his accordion. Seeing such interest, her father purchased a 48 bass Alvari which lasted her until some success in a talent quest led to a contract with a touring show, when, she decided a full size accordion was needed.

From about 1938 Toni was featured during interval for the Amalgamated Theatre circuit around Auckland. She then toured with the Santos Brothers, she playing accordion and they, banjo and guitar. On completion of this tour she joined the Arcadian Revellers Revue which entertained around Auckland and at military camps during the war. She remembers the mud and tents but also the appreciation for her many patriotic efforts which included fundraising from the deck of a truck. The American Navy presented her with a Certificate of Merit and she is listed on the Scroll of Honour of the NZ Variety Artists Club. She became a regular artist at the Trocadero Cabaret in 1943 remaining until it closed in 1951.

Toni married in 1949 and her honeymoon took her to England where eye specialists had to inform her that nothing could be done about her failing eye sight

and she faced imminent inevitable blindness. While this did occur within a few years, Toni continued her entertaining including a command performance for Princess Alexandra in 1972. Although now blind she makes costumes for her concert party, even a pearly suit for her husband, and she keeps an orderly home which she shares with her golden labrador guide dog. As well as entertaining on her accordion, Toni is an accomplished ventriloquist. Still performing for hospitals, senior citizens and others, she demonstrates the spirit of artistry with a unique strength of personality.

Tango

What is Tango?

A melancholy thought that can be danced? The musical expression of nostalgia?

The mythology of Tango is complex and elusive. What we do know is that Tango was born from the wave of immigration to Argentina in the late Nineteenth Century. Predominately Italian and Spanish immigrants created a cultural mix that was in turn inspired by the popular Cuban Tango Habanera rhythm, the rural Milonga dance and African Candombe drumming from neighbouring Uruquay.

I was fortunate to be at 'The Basement' in Sydney in February to see and hear *Fuego Lento* a Sydney based Tango quintet formed in 2007. Bringing together an eclectic mix of musicians, they are united by a desire to explore Tango; from Osvaldo Pugliese's more traditional sounds to the more contemporary Nuevo Tango of Astor Piazzolla.

Exploring the music in concert and at Milongas, the group have developed an exciting and original approach.

They played a great mixture of Tango and the hour whizzed by. Judging from the applause from an appreciative audience, who thoroughly enjoyed the programme, they could have listened to more.

The talented leader of the ensemble is pianist and composer Daniel Wallace -Crabbe, with Daniel Weltlinger –violin-, Elizabeth Jones –accordion-, James Menzies –double bass- and Julian Gough –alto saxophone.

If they should perform at a venue near you it would be worth while to hear them.

SHORT HISTORY OF THE ASA

....continued

2006 was a very interesting one for the ASA with lots of varied activities by individuals and groups. It was also one of change for the way in which the society was conducted.

After working hard for so many years in various capacities in Victoria and then President of the Victorian committee, Heinz Dabernig resigned and his position was taken over by John Kalkbrenner snr

In March 2006 a young member of the NSW Orchestra - Amelia Granturco was invited to play some background music while drinks were served and during supper, at the opening of a photographic exhibition at Club Marconi. The exhibition "From the back blocks to the frontlines" celebrated Italian Settlers in southwest Sydney and was opened by the Hon. Gough Whitlam -In the photo with Amelia.



The NSW State Championship was held in April with Ivan Liashenko the new State Champion.



The AATA competitions were held at the end of May. The Youth Orchestra performed at the final concert to an enthusiastic audience at the Italian Club. The orchestra won the orchestra championship and the younger members performed successfully in the solo and trio classes. The following weekend 23 members travelled to Auckland, New Zealand. The Youth Orchestra performed at both the welcome and farewell concerts. The highlight of the farewell concert was a performance by Alexander Shurinov, the winner of the Piano Accordion class of the 2005 Coupe Mondiale competitions. He performed fantastically and received a standing ovation. 16

A big step in promoting the accordion in Australia to the world happened in July. Two papers written by Elizabeth Jones had been accepted for conferences and publication. She was invited to attend the 27th. World Conference of the International Society of Music Education in Kuala Lumper, where she presented both papers.

In August, Australia was visited by the Viennese Accordion Ensemble. They toured to Perth, Melbourne, Wollongong and Sydney. It had been some years since their first visit so it was pleasing to be able to see them again.

In Victoria, Bernadette Conlon was busy with the Accordion Orchestra of Melbourne which she had founded. Several concerts were held and Bernadette released CD.s. of her various playing styles.

The Victorian division had a busy time. They held their first State competitions for many years in June, which proved to be highly successful, with a promise to make it an annual event again. The annual 'Accordion in Concert' took place in July and featured a young group of 5 to 10 year olds, the ASA Victorian Orchestra, a new quintet formed by Gunter Zalisz, John Kalkbrenner jnr., Ann-Elise Koerntjes and introduced Kemal Curan and his sister Indira who played solo piano.

The 2006 annual Festival was held on the Gold Coast in Queensland at the Nara Resort in October. The resort enabled attendees to have a holiday as well as compete, which was very successful. The competitions followed the usual pattern, but the National Australian Championship did not have any competitors this year. The Australasian Champion for 2006 was Ann-Elise Koerntjes with an aggregate mark of 86.65.

The main topic for discussion at Congress was the change in how the Society was to operate.

From the 20th. July 2006 the Accordion Society of Australian became an association incorporated in NSW. Instead of being under the umbrella of ASIC (and the complicated and expensive system) we transferred to the Office of Fair Trading. The name and logo remained the same with the words Incorporated in NSW added. We now have a Public Officer who is the primary contact for the Office of Fair Trading. Mr. Guy Dawson, a solicitor in the Southern Highlands of NSW agreed to take on this position in an honorary capacity. All records must be kept as before and after the AGM (Congress) the financial statements must be lodged by the Public Officer with the Office of Fair Trading. From now the title of Federal President will no longer exist. The committee of the ASA will be President, Vice President (x2), Treasurer, Secretary and Committee Members (X4). Division as a title will disappear and will now be a sub-committee with members having the same titles as before eg President, Vice President etc. It was decide to hold the next Festival in July 2007 in Sydney. Later in October Elizabeth Jones with partner Simon went to Norway for the 59th. Coupe Mondiale which was held in Asker a municipality just outside Oslo, the Capital of Norway. She went to the opening and closing sessions of the General Assembly. It was good to see Australia represented. During the final concert June Jones was made an "Honoured Friend of the Accordion" – an award given by the CIA to a person in recognition of hard work in promoting and working for the accordion, but not a player. To end a very busy year in NSW a very enjoyable Christmas Party was held with plenty of Christmas Carols and Music.
