Some people wanted to have a photo with Dino and his accordion. Everyone said they really enjoyed his music and want him to come back to perform again.

Jonathon and Adam were both very exited and pleased with Dino's performance and his virtuoso skills and already have plans to include Dino and his accordion in some of their future projects. That opens the door for further acquaintances and promotion of concert accordion music.

We hope that this is a big step to bring the accordion back in spotlight and in concert halls where it belongs.

Less then two weeks before the Magical Musical Mornings concert there was another big event that involved accordion which is promising it's return to fame and popularity.

John St Peeters, singer, songwriter, musician, and one of the most dynamic performers in Australia, invited Melbourne Accordion Orchestra as a surprise to perform at his father's 80th birthday party. His father was an accordion player himself and even John made his start with accordion under the name Johnny Lo Piccolo. His first singles were accordion tracks and he was known as the "Squeezebox Kid".

The party was held at the receptions in Barkly St Footscray with more then 200 guests.

After the Orchestra played couple of pieces John came to Dino with the microphone and told him that his father said Dino reminds him of John when he was a young performer and if he could play any solo pieces, even though it was not planned and Dino hadn't practised any solo pieces.

Dino moved in front of the orchestra and played "Variations on Ukrainian theme" which audience accepted with great ovations. Orchestra played one more piece "Funiculi, Funicula" with audience clapping all the way through.

After the performance John came to the back room with his wife and her father who was in tears and wanted to meet Dino and congratulate him on a great performance. He also was an accordion player and he was so happy to see that the accordion is alive and there are still young people who enjoy accordion music.

John said that he's got great ideas for Melbourne Accordion Orchestra and Dino and they have already arranged another performance together with John St Peeters on 21 July.

Unfortunately there aren't any photos because it was a private party.

There also was a concert of famous composer, singer and multi instrumentalist Ian Tiersen this month at the Melbourne Recital Centre which we attended. Unfortunately he didn't play any accordion music which is what we hoped to see live but it was great to meet him in the foyer after the concert and surely a beautiful concert to remember.

Kevin Friedrich Honoured at Dargaville Concert by Harley Jones

For the 5th time, the concert 'Music with Kevin Friedrich and Friends' was held in Dargaville, New Zealand at the Lighthouse Function Centre. This picturesque Centre overlooking the town and river, was sold out with quite a few people being turned away. Dargaville was Kevin Friedrich's home town before he moved to the USA at 18 years of age, to go to UMKC University to gain his degree majoring in accordion.

Kevin Friedrich returns to New Zealand annually to make this fundraising concert for the Dargaville museum where there is a permanent historical accordion display titled 'Accordion Gems - A Master Collection of Accordions Through Time'. This year included the opening of an exhibition to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the New Zealand Accordion Association (NZAA). The NZAA organized a bus from Auckland to the concert and the opening of that display.

At this concert, Kevin Friedrich was presented the NZAA Life-time Achievement Award by NZAA President Sonja Palinich to honor Kevin Friedrich for all that he has done for the accordion in New Zealand over the years. At the same time, there was also a cutting of a birthday cake in honor of Kevin's 50th birthday with the audience giving him a standing ovation.

The concert included accordionists Kevin Friedrich, Lionel Reekie and Maurice Jones the NZAA Orchestra plus dancers, singers and musicians from the Dargaville area.

YOGI MARTIN (1953 approx – 2012) – NEW ZEALAND

Grant "Yogi" Martin Rest In Peace

Grant "Yogi" Martin passed away on 25th April of a heart attack. Funeral is Sunday 29th April, 10.30pm, Waikare Marae, Waerenga Rd, Te Kauwhata.

Yogi Martin was an accordionist with his own unique style, who had toured within New Zealand as well as to UK, China, Australia and other parts of the world, always to excellent acclaim. Above is a video clip of Yogi.

Yogi's interest in the accordion was first aroused when he heard veteran New Zealand accordionist Silvio de Pra play. Silvio's wife Lesley is his aunt. His first teachers were Dot Braithwaite and Dan Whellan and then he studied with Peter Torckler for some time.

Several of Yogi's family had played accordion including an aunt, Emily Herewini who played for dances in the Waikato area from about World War II times until the 1970's.

As one of Peter Torckler's top students he competed with success at local and national competitions in the 1960's and commenced professional playing about 1970. Even then, Yogi was determined to have a distinctive style and his success meant the accordion became his main source of income throughout his life.

Yogi achieved successes overseas, earning second in the finals of the 1979 "New Faces" TV competition in Melbourne, Australia and was the featured artist at the NAO North West Championships in Fleetwood, UK in 2007 as well as numerous successes professionally in China and elsewhere.

An unreliable personality, especially in his younger days, prevented Yogi Martin from achieving the fame and success his superb performing skills would have expected, however, his most engaging personality, with a very likeable sense of humor, meant he was well loved by all who knew him. Audiences enjoyed his music immensely and for that reason, we have placed the video clip online.

Grant "Yogi" Martin always gave great pleasure to his listeners and his music was a superb advertisement for accordion. Yogi Martin RIP

VALE SILVIO DE PRA - NEW ZEALAND

Silvio De Pra has sadly passed away on 1st May 2012. Excerpt about Silvio De Pra from the book, The History of the Accordion in New Zealand (catalog: nzaa1081).

Born in Belluno, Northern Italy, at the age of ten Silvio De Pra began to play the accordion and at twelve joined his fathers dance band. They performed at many Italian weddings, often lasting from the afternoon to well into the hours of the next day. He still remembers playing his accordion until so tired he could hardly continue to hold it.

At eighteen years of age he formed his own band, playing all around the Belluno province. When work became scarce in his own village Silvio moved away to find employment and was lucky to be able to supplement his income by playing the accordion. After some time he moved to Switzerland, where the Basori Company (for whom he worked) had international operations that took him to Belgium, Denmark, England and in 1955 to New Zealand where he has lived since.

Silvio fell in love with New Zealand and New Zealanders fell in love with him. He was engaged to broadcast with IXR Radio station band as a guest in the evenings and on weekends he would entertain the crowds at The Rivertea Cabaret. After six months Silvio moved to Auckland and in 1958 he became a full-time entertainer. In 1987, the Prime Minister of New Zealand, Sir Robert Muldoon presented Silvio with the Benny Award from The Variety Artist Club. During his years in Auckland he continued broadcasting for Radio and Television and also performed at The Wintergarden Lounge. The Sorrento, Fagels, Pinesong, Hi Diddle Griddle, The Dutch Kiwi, Poenamo, The Intercontinental Hotel and many private functions. Today you will find him still at private functions or at Santa Lucia or The Colosseo Restaurants.

Silvio would have to be one of the most popular cultural ambassadors Italy has ever had in New Zealand, where he feels part of the scene. He became naturalised as soon as he was able to in 1960. He and his New Zealand wife Lesley have two daughters, Gianna and Chiara.

Silvio now plays an accordion with MIDI attached which enables him to accompany his singing with a full sound. This tremendous flexibility takes away the need of a backing group, making Silvio one of the most versatile, and self contained solo artists in New Zealand. He has an endless repertoire of international music from romantic European to the melodic masterpieces of Italy.

Silvio has made a large contribution to the accordion in New Zealand as Chairman of the Accordion Examination Board of New Zealand and has been an examiner for many years. He is also a regular adjudicator at the New Zealand Accordion Championships. He recorded "Souvenirs for You" in 1981 and has now recorded "An Evening with Sivio de Pra" on both CD and Cassette.

2007 was a busy year for Victoria and NSW. It was a successful year in Victoria for the accordion. The committee held monthly meetings with many programmes and issues dealt with successfully. The main aim was to provide members and the public with a variety of activities such as concerts and picnics. There had been long standing issues with former member Bernadette Conlon which had divided the accordion community in Melbourne.

Bernadette had moved to America to live, with the result that the members of her orchestra now affiliated with the ASA and participated in the recent State Championships. The Victorian ASA Orchestra was busy and had performed at ten engagements this year. The future was looking bright for the accordion in Victoria. New shirts had been bought for the orchestra and new music had been acquired via e bay.

The ASA in NSW had a busy year organizing overseas tours and local competitions. The NSW Youth Orchestra again toured New Zealand and participated in the NZAA competitions. It was pleasing to see more young participants at these competitions. The NSW Youth Ensemble had already received an official invitation to perform at the concerts to be held for the Coupe Mondiale which was to be held in Auckland NZ in 2009.

The Australian Institute of Music in Sydney, thanks to President Elizabeth Jones, was actively promoting the accordion with high profile performances at NSW Career Expo, AIM Graduating ceremonies, NSW Art Gallery concerts, St. Andrew's Cathedral and AIM showcases. All AIM events targeted high school audiences with invitations sent out to all NSW High Schools. Potentially a huge exposure for the accordion.

The 2007 Festival was held at the Pacific International Hotel in Bankstown, Sydney. This was attended by Pierre Varo and members of the Reunion Island Polyphonia Orchestra a total of 40 musicians. The orchestra comprised of accordions, keyboards, violins, drums and assorted brass instruments. The accordionists also participated in the competitions as solo, duet, group as well as the band and orchestra categories. Other competitors also came from NSW, Victoria, South Australia, Queensland and the ACT.

The Australasian Champion for 2007 was Lina Chegodaev, with an aggregate mark of 93.44%. The Australian National Championship was not awarded, but Jedda Kassis was given an encouragement award for her performance which earned an aggregate mark of 83.45% (required mark 85%).



The rest of 2007 proved busy with younger members promoting the accordion via their schools. Kenneth Liu organized a visit from the Youth Orchestra to his school at which he played solo, Amelia, Jedda and Dominque played Liber-tango, Amelia demonstrated the use of the bellows through bellow shakes and gave a rendition of the Chicken Dance. To conclude the performance, a Christmas Carol medley was performed with staff and students joining in with the singing. 2007 had been a strong year of growth for the ASA, and a year where so many members had contributed.

The Festival for 2008 was to be held in Adelaide, but because of commitments for the younger competitors of Sydney, it was to be held in October.
