

MELBOURNE ACCORDION CUP EVE CONCERT

Coatesville Bowls Club, Bentleigh, Victoria Monday November 3, 2014, organised by the Bentleigh Organ Music Club

The high point of the Melbourne Spring Racing Carnival is the Melbourne Cup, the race that 'stops the nation'. Held on the first Tuesday of November, we have for eight straight years since the departure of our founder Bernadette Conlon held our annual concert on the Monday evening before this race. The attendance was near full capacity and we commenced the first half with the orchestra playing a Russian medley called Zwischen Don und Wolga, a medley of beautiful Russian folk songs and lullabies arranged by Adolf Gotz. Next came B96, a slow dramatic piece by Alexander Chymkov. To change the tempo we then played a March called Greetings to Kiel by Frederick Spohr to commemorate a successful military campaign in 1863. We then changed the mood and played one of Edith Piaff's favourites Under Paris Skies by Nils Nobath. Spring Dance, a fast moving piece by Ukrainian composer Vladamir Zubitski picked up the pace, and finally we played the famous composition by the Eagles called Hotel California. This was a shared effort by Don Felder, Don Henley and Glenn Fry.



The orchestra vacated the stage and our musical director Iryna Stepko joined with our newest member, Luci Ferenbach to play Little Storey, a lovely moving piece by Janusz Wojtarowicz followed by the famous tango



Liebertango by Astor Piazzolla. The second duet combination then took to the stage in Palmi Snorrason and Jeanette Benzing with their pair of super six Scandallis playing a jolly polka by Pietro Frozini called Spick and Span, followed by Harlem Nocturne by Earle Hagen.

A first for this year saw the two duet teams join to form the Melbourne Accordion Quartet playing Melodia in la menor by Astor Piazzolla then Exprompte, a classic piece by Ukrainian composer Alex. Chymkov.



Next came our guest soloist Dino Kocic playing Impasse by Frank Angelis, followed by Plus Ultra by A. Piazzolla, finishing off with Variations on a Ukrainian Theme by Palmer Hughes.

Interval was then called by our MC Peter Maz. whereupon the ladies committee put on generous supper with tea, coffee and a variety of biscuits and cakes to the delight of all patrons. Lee

Puccini got busy selling the orchestra's CDs to help finances.

The final part of the concert saw the orchestra return to the stage to play La Paloma a tango by Sebastian Yradier followed by a medley of Frank Sina-

tra's famous hits entitled Frankie Boy Forever which attracted a generous applause. Next came Trumpet Echo Polka by Slavko Avsenik which I would call happy music! We all know about Henry Mancini's music "Pink Panther" well Alex Chymkov has written



a sequel in the same style called "Pink Panther's Brother" which was appreciated by the audience. Our music program is never boring! Next came 'A Swinging Safari' by Bert Kaempfert which failed to chart in 1972 when released but has been recorded by many since. Our final presentation was 'ABBA'- The Best Of arranged by Mathtthias Hennecke which ties together six of their most popular hits and was thoroughly enjoyed by all, and was a fitting finale for our concert.

The Organ Club's President Mr.Cliff Washfold took the microphone to thank the members for supporting the event and the performers for their music and invites us to return in 2015 for another "Cup Eve" concert.

Tradition 2.1

Korrontzi Arc Music/Select

THERE are other forms of Spanish folk music beyond flamenco that exhibit similar passion and panache but carry a Celtic accent. In the northwest regions of Galicia and Asturias. pipes and bagpipes are the driving force. East of those provinces, Euskadi or Basque country is the domain of the button accordion. Agus Barandiaran, founder-leader of Korrontzi, one of the better-known Basque folk ensembles, is a virtuoso player of the trikitixa or so-called devil's bellows - as his debut international release amply attests. Along with countryman Kepa Junkera, he has not only popularised his instrument locally but taken the related genre further afield. In Tradition 2.1, Barandiaran and his compadres doff a collective cap to their rich heritage while bending boundaries with cosmopolitan guests. Indeed, in his opening composition. Diatonic Bilbon, with assistance from renowned Irish flautist and uillean pipes player Michael McGoldrick and a range of other folk instrumentation, Korrontzi's frontman acknowledges the ascent of his instrument from rural status to acceptance in big cities such as Bilbao. In the next track, Parfums De Musiques, Barandiaran incorporates the Madagascan valiha (tube zither) of Justin Vali and a Zimbabwean choral section while creeping into bluegrass territory. He's closer to home and Celtica in later jousts with distinguished Galician and Asturian bagpipers Susana Seivane and Jose Manuel Tejedor. Percussion and handclapping propel



Maria Muneira, an eponymous tribute to a legendary Galician dancer. Aupa Maurizia pays homage to a Basque icon, tambourine player Maurizia Aldeiturriaga, with a recording of her voice accompanied by alboka (a double reed horn), the leader's trikitixa and a more modern Swiss invention, Hang, played by Israeli Liron Man. In La Foule, the accordionist combines with flamenco guitar maestro Javier Limon on an instrumental waltz of Argentinian origin. Later, in Flamendango, the same pairing strikes common ground between Basque and Andalusian roots. Elsewhere, Barandiaran's trikitixa adds subtle Basque flavouring to a traditional piece from Portugal, Portusalda. While the emphasis throughout the set is rightly on the prowess of the lead accordionist and his rhythm section, several tracks put vocals to the fore. Tradition 2.1 is a readily accessible album that's eve opening and ear pleasing yet genuinely boundary-breaking.

Closet Accordion Players of America By Cheri Thurston 1999

Although I guess I've never admitted it to my parents, I have to say that I'm very grateful to have taken lessons all through childhood. Yes, I learned to play the accordion. But I learned a whole lot more, as well.

I was four and a half when my parents told me I was going to take accordion lessons. The way I remember it, they handed me an accordion, dropped me off at Mern Reitler's accordion studio in downtown La Junta, Colorado, and left. I had no feelings about it either way. I just knew that when my parents told me to do things, I did them. "Brush your teeth . . . Eat your vegetables . . . Take accordion lessons." It was all the same to me.

For six months I had a tiny accordion. We colored the keys with crayons - red for C, blue for D, black for E, orange for F, green for G, brown for A, purple for B. My fingernails were then colored with corresponding colors, as was the music. To play a song, I would match the color on a note to the color of my fingernail to the color on an accordion key.

When I was five, I was invited to play at a Rural Electric Company banquet. All I remember about the whole thing is crying and pitching a fit. I was so little they wanted me to put my chair on top of a table, so they could see me better. For some reason, I was appalled by that idea. I guess I thought it was undignified. At any rate, I carried on until they gave up and let me sit in a proper chair on the floor, where chairs are supposed to be.

In six months I had graduated to a 120-bass accordion. For the next seven years, I took lessons from Mern Reitler. I don't remember liking them or disliking them. It was something I did. It was part of my life. When Mern retired, my parents found another teacher for me for a couple of years, and then I took lessons from my wonderful uncle, Joe Fazio, until I graduated from high school.

I am so grateful for all those years of lessons. Yes, I'm glad I learned to play the accordion. I'm also glad I learned to read music. But I learned so much more. Here are some of the things that come to mind:

- I learned discipline. Every day I came home from school and practiced for a half hour or so. It was part of my routine. I don't think I hated doing it. I don't think I loved doing it. I just did it because I needed to practice in order to learn what I needed to learn that week.

Later in life, as I was practicing to become a writer, I disciplined myself every summer to work on my writing for four hours every day. It was hard to do sometimes, but I did it. More important, I knew that it was possible to practice something every day and get better at it. I had spent two-thirds of my childhood doing just that. There was no question in my mind that I could discipline myself to practice and improve.

- I learned that I didn't have to have immediate gratification for everything I did. Learning can take place in spurts or giant leaps or slow, steady baby steps. I learned to feel satisfaction in achieving long-term goals like learning to play difficult pieces of music.
- I learned to be responsible. I had weekly lessons to prepare for. My parents were paying for those lessons and also expecting me to succeed. So I did. I truly believe the seeds of responsibility were planted with those earlier music lessons. The responsibility I learned then transferred to my schoolwork when I turned six.
- I learned the reward of inner satisfaction. I didn't need someone to tell me when I had mastered a piece. I knew when I had it, and I could feel good about it - whether or not anyone praised me. (My parents weren't real "praisers," and neither was Mern, so that didn't happen a lot.)

- I learned to fake it. I was always being asked to play the accordion for local functions, and my parents insisted that I enter contests like the Farm Bureau talent contest or the Kiwanis Stars of Tomorrow contest. I hated to perform. I was painfully shy and always terrified. "Smile!" everyone would say, though the last thing I felt like doing was smiling. I longed to play an instrument like the piano, which would let me play without facing the audience head-on.

Still, I smiled. My brothers and sister would sit in the front row and make faces at me, to remind me. I learned to smile and act like I was having the best time in the world, and the judges would always make comments like, "You look like you were having such a wonderful time!"

I wasn't.

The ability to fake it turned out to be one of the most useful skills I have ever learned. For example, when I was a small, 22-year-old teacher facing, for the first time, a class of 32 hostile 8th grade remedial students, I was terrified. I reached back and summoned up that ability to fake it. This time, instead of smiling, I acted like I was brave and strong and knew exactly what I was doing. The kids bought it.

I have used the same skill in so many situations in my life. In fact, I believe "faking it" is one of the most valuable things I ever learned. I owe it all to years of accordion lessons.

- I learned not to announce my mistakes. If I was performing and hit a wrong note, the thing to do was not stop, wince, sigh, grimace or start over. I learned to keep going, to recover quickly. Often, I found, people didn't even notice a mistake that was huge to my own ears, if I just went on.
- And that's true about life, I think. We all make mistakes. We all goof up. The trick is to keep going. The trick is not to make our mistakes worse by dwelling on them, pointing them out to one and all. It's a lot better to just deal with them and go on as smoothly as possible.
- I learned that "thank you" is often all you need to say. I remember playing the accordion at a dinner and then standing, an embarrassed an awkward thirteen-year-old, as people complimented me afterwards. I had no idea what to say. I turned red, looked down, was at a loss for words. My mother took me aside later and told me how to be more gracious. "Just say thank you," she said.
- "Won't that mean I agree with them?" I asked, very afraid that I might appear conceited.
- "No," she said. "It means you are thanking them for the compliment, not that you agree. That's all you need to say."

I remember being absurdly grateful for this advice. Maybe my mom did know a thing or two after all, I thought.

Actually, she turned out to know a lot more than a thing or two. But of course it took me years to recognize that fact.

The 67th Coupe Mondiale of the Confédération Internationale des Accordéonistes (CIA - IMC, an official NGO partner of UNESCO) was held in Salzburg, Austria hosted by the long term CIA member, the Austrian Accordion Association (Harmonikaverband Österreichs - HVÖ).



Attracting participation from more than 30 countries around the world, the festival was the largest ever held, even requiring some categories to be held over two days. What makes the instrument unique is that is features the older and quite cumbersome style of free-bass system having one bank of buttons for the stradella system and then an extra bank of 3 rows for free bass. Ironically, this style of instrument was quite high on the wish list for the Dargaville display.

The Coupe Mondiale website www.coupemondiale.org contains many pictures from the event in daily reports, as well as video library archive of all the contestants and concerts that were prepared by Harley and Kevin. This archive of material serves as a valuable resource as well as fitting souvenir of this outstanding event held in the Salzburg Congress Center.

The next CIA activity will take place in France, when the CIA begins their year long celebration of their 80th anniversary. The Winter Congress will be held from 6-8 March, 2015 in Paris, the city where the organization was founded, followed by the 68th Coupe Mondiale in Turku, Finland from 6-11 October, 2015.
