

# THE BIG SQUEEZE ACCORDION BAND MELBOURNE BUSKING AND BUILDING AN AUDIENCE

With a shortage of gigs for the first couple of months of 2017, we came up with the idea of approaching local markets where we could busk and at the same time practice our repertoire of pieces.

The response was very positive and our first market, on the 11<sup>th</sup> March, was



the Heide Makers' Market held in the grounds of the Heide Museum of Modern Art in Bulleen. The gardens are beautiful and the market nestles in a valley near the Yarra river.

We played at the top of the site and the slope down to the stalls, formed a natural amphitheater, allowing our music to be heard all over the market.

The weather was superb with just a hint of Melbourne Autumn in the air that quickly made way for a very warm day. We played two brackets of about forty-five minutes each starting at 9.30 and finishing at 12noon. We put out an accordion for busking; collecting some contributions and also selling a CD. We all agreed that



it was a very pleasant way to spend a Saturday morning.

Our second market was on the 18<sup>th</sup> March. Part of the Melbourne Farmers' Markets, this one is held in the grounds at the Fairfield Primary School. It has been running for five years at this site and has a great selection of organic



fruit and veg, honey, cider, cheese, wine etc.

Jimmy visited the market in February and selected a site for us under a large tree adjacent to the coffee carts. A terrific position; with plenty of customers wandering past.

Again, a beautiful Melbourne Autumn morning; a little cooler than the week before but that again morphed into a warm sunny day. We set up early to

play at 9am. The stall holders were welcoming and the crowds very appreciative of the pieces we played and very intrigued by our accordions. The children especially were mesmerised. On one occasion we counted seven children squatting down at the front of the band – enraptured. A parent cheekily asked us if we were available for babysitting!!! Again we sold a CD and collected quite a large contribution in the case. However, the most rewarding

moment came at the end of the morning when the stall holders pooled together some money as a thank you for providing such wonderful entertainment and asked us to return. What more could we ask for!!

Our next gig is at the Holland Festival in Berwick on the 8<sup>th</sup> April. We are busy brushing up on some Dutch



numbers that we may slip into our repertoire.

# Thank you to Griffiths Volunteers



# My Love for the Accordion - Michael J Glinski

This article is simply to express my joy at being able to play the accordion.

I am not a great accordion player by any stretch of the imagination, but really enjoy, and look forward to strapping on the 'box' (I learned that term from the late and great Kenny Laybourne, who I'll speak about later in this article) in the evenings, and discovering something new about it. It may seem strange to say 'discover some-



thing new about it', but after about to 20 years of playing I reckon I know conservatively about 20% of its capabilities.

My late father was from Poland, having gone through the German concentration camps. He loved the accordion, and although not being able to play more than a few basic tunes, had other ideas for me! He started me with an accordion teacher in 1964 when I was seven years of age (Mr Peter Bernar) of Elwood, and each Saturday afternoon for about three years we would travel across there with my red 80 bass Excelsior accordion in tow. I can't say I enjoyed the lessons, because Mr Bernar was a tough, old-school Italian gentleman who pushed me pretty hard. I didn't get away with not practicing, and was held to account on a weekly basis! One of the first tunes he taught me was 'Song of the Islands'. I remember this clearly, because at our monthly jam session with Frank Berens and the accordion society group this was one of the first songs we played together.

I always found it very hard, and still do, to read music. One day Mr Bernar took me into the kitchen after a lesson and struck tuning forks, asking me to name the note. I got seven out of the eight pitches correct, which he was most complimentary of, saying I had pretty well close to perfect pitch.

The reason I mention this is that I am very fortunate to be able to play by ear, and can hear a tune and have it pretty well right (to my hearing anyway!) in a short period of time.

Anyway, by 1967 I was playing at Polish parties in Fawkner, much to my

father's delight, coming home late at night; actually early morning, lying on the back seat of his 1956 Chrysler De Soto!

Unfortunately I gave the accordion away, and in 1970 the Excelsior was sold, with its beautiful mother-of-pearl keys. I wish I still had it now.

Fortunately, my father had bought a really nice 120 bass Paolo Soprani (pictured below) from Mr Bernar when I started with him, and I still have this beautiful instrument. It is a little unusual due to having square mute plates rather than the more common round ones.



I took the accordion up again in 1990 when I was 33 after a renewed interest. In 1997, after seeing the brilliant Bernadette Conlon play I took 12 months worth of lessons with the most professional Ian Southwood in Footscray, which helped me a lot.

My big break and great luck was when I went to an accordion recital by the late Kenny Laybourne, playing his magnificent electronic Farfisa Super Syntaccordion and doing a medley of numbers from all around the world. I approached Kenny after that concert and made a personal friend of him and his then wife Cheryl. We had many great evenings of music, and he helped me

so much with the accordion. We had an affinity really; we both could not read music, but sounded pretty good jammin' together!

Kenny was born to play, having started when he was just two and a half. His grandmother bought him an accordion he pointed out to her in a shop. Her decision to buy Kenny the accordion was made after he was trying to press, in some order mind you, the buttons on her cardigan as he sat on her lap! His ear was brilliant, and he would listen to me play and constantly say "Can't you hear how you missed that half-note, Mike?" in his Cockney English accent. I couldn't hear it, but when we put that sharp or flat in, it made all the difference! Sadly we lost Kenny a couple of years ago, and I miss him still.

Such was the rapport I had built with Kenny, he saw fit to pass his beautiful accordion to me once it got too much for him to play. I spent many nights over a few weeks stripping the instrument down and lovingly restoring it to new condition, showing it to him only weeks before he passed. He was very happy to see it so lovingly respected (pictured).



Drawing ever nearer to retirement after 38 years with Victoria Police, I feel blessed to have a passion and level of talent to make music an integral part of my life after my career. In 2013 I performed a concert for 200 Protective Services Officers at Bobby McGee's in Melbourne playing Kenny's Farfisa, and in October last year did a concert for 300 people at the Box Hill Civic Centre on my father's Paolo Soprani. (pictured below)



Recently I discovered a terrific European band called Ausseer Bradlmusi. Together with a Swedish accordionist I really admire who specialises in Frosini (Alf Hagedal), I spend much time playing along in an attempt to master some of their great pieces. However, in my opinion Toralf Tollefsen is the grand master of the accordion. His video rendition of the 'Cuckoo Waltz' (available for viewing on Youtube) is masterful and magnificent.

What a great instrument the accordion is! Although it is very versatile, I have concentrated on European waltzes, marches and polkas; I think that must be my father's influence coarsing through my veins.

I would really love to crown my passion for the accordion with buying a Scandalli Super VI eventually. Whenever I hear an accordion; whether it be on a CD, at a restaurant like the Hofbrauhaus, in a shopping centre or in the city being played by a busker, my heart skips a beat.



# Maestro Don Quattrocchi



Don Quattrocchi contributed most of his life promoting the piano accordion. During the 70s he had the largest music school in country Victoria in Australia.

During his career he taught music at Kilmore Assumption College, Notre Dame College and Goulbourn Valley Grammar School.

At that time there were no accordion exams in the state of Victoria. Don composed music for accordion exams which was accepted by the Australian Guild of Music and Speech.

# Franco Cambarerí Accordionist, Composer, Producer

Melbourne composer Franco Cambareri was barely able to walk when he first heard the magic sound of the piano accordion – an instrument he promptly fell in love with and dreamed of one day possessing.

From the shores of the Calabria region of Italy and at the tender age of fifteen, Franco boarded the steamer Neptune to make the long voyage down under and soon after arriving in Melbourne he started working



to help pay for the rest of his family to join him in Australia. Franco was seventeen when he finally had enough money to put a deposit on an accordion and pay for one music lesson per week – his determination to learn meant he spent many a long hour in study and practice.

In the early sixties Franco spent twelve months in Rome furthering his studies in music and on return to Australia he formed a Quintet, a band which met with instant success and enjoyed popularity on radio, television and at social clubs and night clubs around Melbourne.

With this experience and after releasing several EP records it was time to move on and in the mid sixties the Trio Franco was born, a combo that was to become so much in demand. They sometimes performed even two or three times a day.

The group was awarded second prize at the first ever-International Song Festival in Melbourne and went on to record and release a number of EP's and a full length LP album. One of the highlights of this period was the collaboration as producers and actors on the weekly television musical program "Carosello". There followed an overseas stint on the South Pacific Island of Fiji where the Trio Franco delighted audiences at many and varied venues.

During this time Franco somehow managed to also teach music and accordion to many young aspiring musicians and today some of Melbourne's finest can lay claim to having their careers initiated from those early lessons.

Franco finally stopped playing and performing in public in 1973 in order to pursue a totally different career path but when he eventually retired around Christmas 2000 the passion for music returned as strong as ever.

He decided to devote himself to composing the music he loved and to date has written some 220 original instrumental works and has 12 CDs to his credit. The first of these, "Tender Feelings" (released through Colossal Records of Australia), has been featured by a number of radio stations across the country and currently most of his music is published by Groovy Music Publishing (www.groovymusic.com.au) as well as many of his compositions are published overseas by Frosini Society (frosinisociety.org) and <a href="MusicForAccordion.com">MusicForAccordion.com</a>

One of Franco's compositions titled "Pour "Pour Aline" was amongst the top ten awarded in the instrumental category from thousands of entries in the Australian Songwriters Association 2007 Song writing Contest, he was awarded 9th place for this piece.

Another composition titled "Capricciosa" also featured on ABC Classic FM as part of the ABC's "Sunday Live" concerts, which are broadcasted throughout Australia and internationally through radio and

the Internet. Guitarist Giuseppe Zangari and Flautist Sally Walker received enthusiastic applause for the performance of the song in a recital transmitted live from the Harold Lobb Concert Hall at the Newcastle Conservatorium of Music.

Franco dedicates the music he writes to his family and friends of which he has many – not surprising for a man and musician whose inspiration for composition comes unmistakably from the heart.

# Jon Persson Accordion Classes for Chinese Seafarers -Pacific Ocean

Beginner accordion classes were recently conducted for Chinese passengers on a 3,000-passenger ship in the fleet of the Princess Cruise Line, one of the largest cruise lines in the world

The classes were limited to 20 students, open to people aged 8-88, and were conducted by American pianist/accordionist, and long-time Princess Cruises musician Jon Persson. As the classes were only 30 minutes long, and held twice during each 5 day cruise, there was not a lot of time to delve deeply into accordion technique.

The lessons focused on a very easy tune that was familiar in many countries, and to the Chinese people, 'Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star'. Moreover, the accordions purchased by the cruise line were basically toy accordions, but were perfectly fine for this purpose. Persson is not a speaker of Mandarin, so it was necessary for the lessons to be translated by another member of the ships staff, which sometimes made the lessons move a bit more slowly than normal.

Nevertheless, the sessions were light-hearted and enjoyed by all, and well-attended, so that the 20 accordions provided were snapped up quickly by the early arrivals.

The orchestra has furthermore been invited to perform in Nuremberg, together with the widely recognised and award-winning Nuremberg Accordion Orchestra on April 30th 2017 to showcase original works by British composers in an international context.
