### Presidents Report

2016 I put forward my suggestions that I thought would improve the Accordion Society in areas that were hindering us, and at the same time further removing us from what I considered to be mainstream music.



With these ideas, I looked forward to a new chapter, a new zest and zeal in the organisation. To some extent we managed to change the Society and we did indeed work on new ways of playing music, promoting ourselves and fundraising on multiple platforms.

I believe that we are far stronger than we were three years ago. However, with our membership numbers roughly the same and our group sizes lacking a little I suggest that there is more that we need to do. We are at a cross road where we can either transform ourselves into something new or we will just teeter away.

My time in Innsbruck, Austria at the World Music Festival helped me to identify problems that face the accordion player in the Accordion Society of Australia and moreover many other countries around the world and their groups and organisations. The biggest hurdle that we have in front of us is what to do with our accordion orchestra. Only 2 weeks ago I heard the Nuremberg Accordion Orchestra, The Hohner Youth Orchestra and The London Accordion Orchestra. These groups are very well trained, their music is performed perfectly. When you listen to them you cannot help but be moved by their amazing sound. It has been 22 years since I last toured Europe and had the opportunity to play and converse with groups of this calibre. I began to think of our small groups back in Australia. Have we been trying to recreate what happens in these other countries? If we have been, then we will surely fail as I believe some of these other places face the same problems we do.

The principle focus of the Accordion Society for many years has been to create the best and strongest orchestra that we can. We have stayed with this antiquated way of playing music across Australia, from Queensland, Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide. All of us have seen these large groups diminish and stop playing all together. I watched as members became older with no younger members coming along to replace or bolster these players. I have talked to these people and they have asked me why no one comes along. People tell me that the accordion is not as popular as it once was in Australia and that it may never be. I will tell you that the accordion is indeed alive in Australia, all over Australia in folk festivals, the Sydney pub scene, Melbourne's music venues. There are more accordionists playing in more groups and bands than ever before, there is however less accordion players working together in accordion orchestras. I suggest that we all need to think about how and if at all the orchestra assists us.

The accordion is a great and versatile instrument and is suited to almost every musical application. As we make our way forward we need to use this unique quality that few other instruments have, I look forward to seeing us instigate positive and new changes in the Accordion Society of Australia. Although there may be some discomfort along the way we will no doubt be part of a stronger and more relevant organisation.

Think about your next step, not the last one you took.




### News from NSW

nominated and will be receiving the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) award which was officially announced to the public in the **2019 Australia Day Honour Role**. On 17 May 2019, I attended the Order of Australia Association Luncheon at Parliament House, Macquarie Street along with other award re-

cipients and my family. On 22 May 2019, I was invited (with my wife Sonya, daughter Tanisha, son Joel (couldn't attend), mum Stefica and my special guest of honour, Mr Ivica Glasnovic - Croatian Consulate General)





to the Investiture Ceremony at Government House, Sydney where I was presented with the Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) by Her Excellency The Honourable Margaret Beazley AO QC, Governor of NSW. This was truly one of the highlights in my life and a memorable occasion that I will never forget. When she presented

me with the award she specifically and sincerely asked me about the

accordion and its popularity in Australia and around the world, which of course I was more than delighted to share with her.

The official award ceremony was followed by drinks and canapés in the beautiful gardens at Government House where we had the opportunity to mix and mingle, take some photos and even have a lovely conversation with Her Excellency The Governor of NSW. Once the formalities were concluded, we moved on to the Opera Bar with family and friends for some celebratory drinks and nibbles. I was absolutely thrilled to have my good friends Ross Maio, Margaret Brandman, Bin (Terry) Lu and other diploma students join me to celebrate this momentous occasion at one of the most spectacular settings in beautiful Sydney Harbour. It was the perfect way to finish the evening and memorable day.



### Medal of the Order of Australia (OAM) Award Summary:

For distinguished service to humanity in Australia, and humanity at large globally (including Dunblane - Scotland, September 11 - USA and Croatia), in the capacity of National and Sydney NSW Coordinator, for two of the most highly successful charity CD singles, "Side by Side - Song for Port Arthur" and "Stop the War in Croatia", National Coordinator for the NAIDOC Week / Reconciliation, "Now It's Time (put things right)" and the Suicide Prevention, "Hold On" charity songs / CD singles, as well as distinguished services to music education and the arts in the capacity of Diploma Music Teacher / Pedagogue, AMEB Diploma Level Examiner, ASA Examiner, Senior Adjudicator, University Academic, Musical Director and Performer.

For service to the community and to the performing arts, particularly through music.

Australia's oldest accordionist turns 100 this year!!!

I also have another huge announcement to make, and that is that my former accordion student and dear friend Willy Stader, celebrated his 100th birth-

### day on the 25th of May

2019...and still going strong! He is currently on a three month world cruise with his accordion by his side, on which the captain, crew and his friends had a 100th birthday celebration in his honour. Congratulations and best wishes from all of us Willy!



Last year my close and dear

friend Judith Hague (accordionist) and I visited Willy at his home in Cremorne Point over looking beautiful Sydney Harbour, Opera House and the Harbour Bridge. Willy asked me to come over to play him a few songs on the accordion which I gladly did. He absolutely loved it and was completely mesmerised. His dear friends Jan and Maria Jarus were also staying with him at the time. It was a lovely morning filled with accordion music, coffee, tea and delicious cakes.

Willy was originally inspired by one of Ross Maio's amazing performances on a cruise ship holiday a few years ago, after which he had a long chat with Ross. Upon his return to Sydney he ended up buying the Roland FR3x which he still plays every day and takes with him on holidays. He called me at the time (2015 - age 96) to commence accordion lessons, however the lessons were short lived. Willy said to me, "I'm enjoying the lessons very much, but unfortunately by the time you are leaving through the front door I have already forgotten everything you have taught me":) In the end, learning and playing by ear was the answer for Willy.

His dear friends Jan and Maria first met Willy in January 2016 through their association with Richard Noel. Richard was holidaying in Australia and together with his late wife Mary, stayed at Willy's place for a couple of weeks. Their friendship with Willy developed through their mutual love of the accordion and Maria and Jan now regularly visit him for a meal, which he insists on cooking himself, to chat about old times, and of course, to play the ac-



cordion together. At times he would first hum a melody of a song which he remembers and is fond of to Jan. Jan would then find the sheet music and they would practise and play together. Once he rang Jan in the evening after one of their visits and started humming this well-known German march. Jan was familiar with the melody, but did not know the name, so after many

hours of searching and listening to marches on the internet, he found the name and the sheet music. It was "Wien Bleibt Wien" composed by Johann Schrammel. The next time Maria and Jan visited Willy, he and Jan had a really great time playing this rousing march together.

On one occasion before one of Willy's world cruises, Jan helped him learn "Charade" and "La Paloma" and a few other popular songs. Afterwards, Willy said that he performed these songs in front of a packed auditorium (800 people!)



on the cruise and received a standing ovation. How about that when you're in you're late 90s going on to 100!!!

### New AMEB Accordion Syllabus status update:

As you would all be already aware from my previous updates on this topic over the last few years, Tania Marx, Milica Krga and I have been working on reviewing and completely overhauling the current AMEB Accordion syllabi. The new proposed AMEB Accordion syllabus was submitted to Mr Bernard Depasquale, CEO AMEB Federal and Mr Steven Hodgson on 7 Feb 2018 for a comprehensive AMEB review and approval by a panel of AMEB Examiners/ Specialists. This long and time consuming process has included a review of all the proposed grade and diploma pieces as well as all of the revised technical requirements. Following the AMEB review, we received comprehensive and extensive questions and suggestions regarding the technical work earlier this year to which we had to respond in detail in February 2019. Thank you Milica for assisting me with this import piece of work and the detailed response back to the AMEB. I am extremely pleased and excited to announce that I have just been advised that the new Accordion syllabus is now in the process of being type set, in readiness for our final review/proof reading and is planned to be released for examining later this year. It has taken a long time to reach this point but is fantastic news for all accordion teachers and students across Australia.

We are appealing to all accordion teachers across Australia to put forward as many students for Accordion AMEB exams so that we can keep the Accordion syllabus alive for many years to come. We are hopeful that the new, freshly updated syllabus will start to see a significant increase in the number of candidates sitting for their Accordion grade exams and all the way up to AMusA and LMusA Diplomas. If numbers stay very low as they have been for a number of years now, or even worse, decline even further, the AMEB will remove the Accordion syllabus from being able to be examined, and that would be an absolute tragedy after all of the incredibly hard work that has been carried out to have the Accordion included into the AMEB Manual of Syllabuses, and now to completely overhaul the Accordion syllabus in an attempt to bring it into the 21st century. Everyone, please help us keep it alive!



### Greetings from Germany!

Paul and I are currently touring around Germany and Austria visiting various music festivals.

Our first stop was the Innsbruck World Music Festival, one of the world's largest accordion orchestra competitions. Everyone was super friendly and it was great to meet so many other accordionists and make some new friends. The exhibitor's stands were a good resource for new sheet music, and also an opportunity to try out and compare different brands of accordions.

The various accordion orchestra performances were very inspiring, but we also enjoyed the ensemble and solo performances. The main attraction of the festival was of course a concert by world famous accordionist Martynas Levickis from Lithuania, he is top class and we really enjoyed his show. But the surprise act for us was the solo performance by Zoran Zorko, who plays a modified midi diatonic accordion -Zoran has a unique fresh modern style and received three standing ovations, basically the audience would not let him leave the stage! He also has a great sense of humour. If you have not heard of Zoran, search on youtube for "U talking to me - Zoran







Zorko" to see an example of his rock/jazz fusion.

On Friday evening we enjoyed the show by Tango Orchestra "Guardia Nueva" from Finland, and the Hohner Klang Orchestra had the whole crowd partying and dancing on Saturday late into the evening. With so many performances and concerts in various halls it was impossible to see everything and we did

miss out on a few things we really wanted to see, including the Southern Cross Ensemble (who performed at the same time as Martynas Levickis).

Around the festival, there was so much to see and do in Innsbruck, which would have to be one of the prettiest settings in Europe with beautiful historic buildings and impressive mountains all around.



On Sunday all festival attendees met up in the Olympia Hall Stadium for the prize presentations. The atmosphere was electric with plenty of Mexican waves, cheer squads, team colours, and audience participation – it felt more like a major sports event! The Hohner Klang Orchestra entertained us again and the Europa Orchestra performed, this was the open orchestra which rehearsed during the festival. We really enjoyed Innsbruck and hope to go again next time.

The second festival we attended so far was in Kirchhaslach in country Bavaria, this featured various brass bands and also some modern folk-rock music bands which incorporate accordions into their act. Our favourite band so far were the Fäaschtbänklers from Switzerland – all of them great musicians and singers who had the audience of several thousand people totally engaged, singing and dancing along. Their accordionist had a key role in the performance and this goes to show that the accordion is a popular and versatile instrument in modern and traditional music. They also make a big point that traditional instruments can play any genre of music – see "Fäaschtbänkler - 26 Genres" in youtube for an example that is sure to put a smile on your face.

### Maclagan Squeezebox Festival

We believe Maclagan holds the only accordion festival in Australia. This year will be our 17<sup>th</sup> year of running a festival for those who love and play accordion music.

Where is Maclagan, you ask? We are a small town in the Toowoomba region of Queensland. The township and surrounding area has a population of 195 but we pack well above our weight when it comes to keeping our community alive. Our festival truly embodies what our small rural communities are all about: resilience, friendship, and having as much fun as possible.

We all know that immigration has influenced the accordion's popularity in Australia, but did you know that more German peoples came to southern Queensland from the Germanic regions of Europe from the 1850s until the start of WW1 than any other ethnic group? These immigrants brought with them their skills and homeland traditions and folkways and came in search of fresh opportunities, land and freedom. Music and food were two particularly strong traditional elements of the German culture that have transplanted to regional Australia.

Maclagan, (once named Bismarck after Chancellor Otto von Bismarck who reigned Germany) is a pioneering German agricultural region. The legacy of the musical styles brought from Germany by the early immigrants can be seen in Maclagan. The township attempts to rekindle the old time song and dance traditions each year for the public and aims to keep some of these accordion traditions alive.

The seed for the festival was planted in 2003 when the Toowoomba Accordion Festival ceased. Les and Stella Weedon, Graham and Lyn Reinke, Mark Schuster and Maria Zann initiated that first festival to showcase their own skills and instruments and to keep the song and dance tradition alive.

Today, the Maclagan Squeezebox Festival is a major event on the annual southern Queensland musical calendar. Accordion players from

'all over' come to perform and there are visitors in the audience from every state in Australia.

A 212-page anthology of stories by those who love and play accordion music was launched at last year's festival showcasing the transformative powers of the festival in bringing back the emotional binds to the brain of music heard in dance halls and at weekend dances of decades past. Copies of this book have made it to the Hohner factory in Trossingen, Germany and to the 2019 Frankfurt Music Festival – Europe's biggest trade fair for the music industry. Details of this book are located elsewhere in this newsletter.

The annual squeezebox festival is a winner for the Maclagan community and is cemented firmly in the yearly plans of most visitors. Why don't you add your name to the growing list of players and spectators who keep the second Saturday in October each year marked on their calendars?





### 2019 Australian International Accordion Championships and Festival - Sydney

Sydney played host to a real variety of accordion music with the Australian Accordion Teachers Association (AATA) annual Championships and Festival, held on 8th and 9th June, by President Tania Lukic-Marx.

Each year this event attracts international competitors and guest performers and this year was no exception with participants from Poland, China, New Zealand, Slovenia together with local and out of state Australian accordionists.

Competitions for solo and duet categories gave an opportunity for players of all levels and ages to showcase their skills. The youngest competitor (pictured right) was just four years of age, and for several categories it was some of the performer's first time on stage.

The 20 years and Under Junior Virtuoso was the highest International category, with the title being won by Jianan Wang and Zelda Mormul (Australia) won both the 12 years and 15 years and under International classes.

The Festival also featured a masterclass with internationally known Primoz Parovel (Slovenia) demonstrating why he is so much in demand as an international adjudicator and teacher. Primoz has recently released a CD recording of Scarlatti works on free bass accordion available through Sony Music.

Music Junction (Melbourne) also exhibited a number of accordions and accordion accessories.

Guest performances throughout the weekend culminated in the Gala Prize winners concert. Held in Club Marconi's impressive auditorium, artists included the ever-popular Sydney Balalaika Orchestra, Southern Cross Accordion Ensemble, (recently returned from the DHV World Music Festival in Innsbruck), Gennady Savkov (Lithuania/Russia), Eduard Bronson and Lionel Reekie (New Zealand).

AATA president, Tatjana Lukic-Marx closed the event with the presentation of certificates to the Trio and Primoz Parovel, and extended an invitation to accordionists all over the world to attend next years' Festival which will be held in August 2020.



A very enjoyable night was had by all.



Afternoon of Music with Kevin Friedrich and Friends

The 12th Annual Afternoon of Music with Kevin Friedrich and Friends took place on Sunday March 31st with a capacity audience at the Lighthouse Function Centre at the Dargaville Museum.



Featuring a variety of artists performing

music from the Stage and Screen, the event serves as an annual fundraiser for the Dargaville Museum.

The afternoon featured a very unusual opportunity to feature a duo of instruments made from the very precious and rare native New Zealand Kauri wood. The wood, often 40,000 years old was used to make both an accordion and a drum, which were featured in duo during the concert. The concert featured the donation of an accordion from the Christchurch Accordion Orchestra, made available by member Merle Kershaw. The instrument was formally accepted by Museum President Ross Newlove and played in the concert.
