He was inundated with submissions and along with some fellow "adjudicators", had no easy task in bringing the submissions down to a recordable number of 21. Each of these pieces is differing in genre, style and instrumentation.

Now! Here's where I come in! I received a random phone call from Scott, who I did not know at all, asking if I played the accordion. With some scepticism I replied yes, and was then given the pitch on the COVID 4740 Community Resilience Project. (4740 being the postcode for Mackay).

More than keen to help out, I presented at the studio unsure of what, how etc. When you have always played from scripted music, it comes as shock to get a piece of paper with lyrics on it and perhaps some chord progressions or the best yet....just a vocal recording from the artist, with no key, no chords, nothing. We have just completed some live shows here in Mackay as part of the soft

release of the CD. The national release will come very soon.

Every artist on the CD volunteered their time and Mackay musos are grateful to Scott for his foresight in this project. Some artists have also donated their royalties to local charities as well as some of the proceeds of the album going to *Supportact*.

### New AMEB Accordion Syllabus status update:

As you would all be already aware from my update at the ASA AGM earlier this year, the new Accordion 2021 Syllabus has finally been published and released for examining this year by the AMEB. Once again, I would like to extend a big thank you to Tania Marx and Milica Krga for all of their hard work, dedication and assistance in bringing this new syllabus to fruition after so many years. In addition I would also like to thank Lionel Reekie for his involvement, assistance and contribution, on behalf of the AATA, in the last stage of the process with the list pieces. This is a fantastic outcome for all accordion teachers and students Australia wide.

NB The old Accordion syllabus will also be examinable in parallel for two more years i.e. 2021 and 2022, after which it will be withdrawn and only the new syllabus will continue to be examined.

For the new Accordion syllabus to be a continued success, we are appealing to all accordion teachers across Australia to put forward as many students for AMEB Accordion exams so that we can keep the Accordion syllabus alive for many years to come. We are hopeful that the new, freshly updated syllabus will start to see a significant increase in the number of candidates sitting for their Accordion grade exams and all the way up to AMusA and LMusA Diplomas. If numbers stay very low as they have been for a number of years now, or even worse, decline even further, the AMEB will remove the Accordion syllabus from being able to be examined, and that would be an absolute tragedy after all of the incredibly hard work that has been done to have the Accordion included into the AMEB examining system and now to completely overhaul the syllabus in an attempt to bring it into the 21st Century.

The good news is, that this year, I have seen a slight increase in candidate numbers already (Video Exams only) due to Covid-19. We are heading in the right direction.

Everyone, please help us keep the AMEB Accordion Syllabus alive. I look forward to seeing you all soon.

Practical Masterclasses like these are very helpful for people wanting to improve their performing. It was a great pleasure to work aside Maurice Jones and Grayson Masefield.

One of the unsung acts of this event is Harley Jones, the man behind the lens. He documents everything from the start to the finish. He often works into the late hours uploading photos/videos/competition marks up to the NZAA website and the site <u>accordions.com</u> also known as Accordions Worldwide. If you want to really know what is happening in the accordion world then you will find it here. Harley has his finger on the pulse every minute of the day and I have always admired his dedication to promoting the accordion. You can find everything from where competitions are around the world to a great catalogue of music available for purchase.





# Creativity in practice

I thought it appropriate to continue to develop the idea of practice through this series of articles aimed at accordionists of all ages and experience levels. In the previous Accordion Review, I looked at the notion of practice and in particular reflective practice in which the student engages more deeply with their own way of learning. All the while keeping in mind that having an experienced teacher whose goals and ideas align with the student's is of the utmost importance.

In this article, I would like to look more closely at how one's practice and therefore musical development can be further enhanced by embracing a creative approach or mindset that has the potential to not only be more interesting and enjoyable but also, knowledge building, fun and engaging.

At the core of the idea of creative practice is the notion that any exercise or practice approach that becomes monotonous or even overly easy needs to be reconfigured, shaken up and messed around with. So, rather than getting into the nitty gritty of the concept, I'll give you practical examples instead.

Let's say I've been working on my Eb harmonic minor scale for a while and I'm starting to feel that while I can play it at a reasonable tempo with both hands over two octaves, it's starting to become a bit mundane. I suddenly notice that while I'm playing the scale, my mind has wondered....hmmmm....I might have beans for dinner tonight... gosh...the washing is still in the machine...I wonder what the cat is doing? I'm sure many of you know recognise that sudden realisation that one's thoughts have been drifting. So, at this point, I must do something to bring my mind back to the task at hand; the Eb harmonic minor scale. The question I will, at this point ask myself is, how can I play this scale differently so that it is not only re-engaging my mind but also creative and musical while helping me to develop my technical confidence and musical knowledge? As with my last article, the danger in telling you what I do, is that you may be less likely to explore your own interesting and challenging ideas. I hope you prove me wrong!

Here's some things I might do while creatively practicing the Eb harmonic minor scale:

• Play one hand at twice the speed of the other (in other words crotchets against quavers). Swap

• Play one hand at three times the speed of the other (quaver triplets against crotchets or if you're feeling brave, quaver triplets against straight quavers!). Swap or try contrary motion

• Play the scale with my LH while improvising an interesting rhythm with my RH

• Play the scale with one hand while play an Eb minor arpeggio with the other

• Play the Eb harmonic minor scale with one hand and the E harmonic minor scale with the other. Ouch!



Please keep in mind that these are my ideas. They may or may not be interesting to you. It doesn't matter, it's the idea that counts. And as I was recently reminded in the excellent book, *The Practice of Practice* by Jonathan Harnum, even if your idea is one that has been invented and taught before, it's the fact that you engaged with and created something that is personally relevant that counts.

The second element of creativity in practice that I would like to discuss is improvisation. For some of you, the suspicious, scary, overwhelming 'I' word. For many players who have either learned from notation or tunes and songs by ear, the idea of improvising can seem daunting. I suspect the main reason is because many musicians have the idea that some forms of improvisation have quite strict and theoretical guidelines that can require considerable time, study, and practice to accomplish a reasonable level of mastery. And in some cases, such as jazz improvisation, this may well be true. If this description fits, then you will be relieved to know that this is not the kind of improvisation that I am talking about.

At the start of each of my daily practice sessions, I allow approximately 20 minutes to freely explore some aspect of either the accordion, or an idea, or a key area, or even something that's unclear until I actually start playing. If you've never done something like this and you're wondering how you might get started, let me make a couple of suggestions. Firstly, there's nothing more evocative than the sound the accordion makes when it breathes. The sound of the bellows, when the air button is depressed; the sound of the sea, the wind, of peace. Why not start with this? Have you ever tried breathing in and out in unison you're your accordion? You might explore how many different sounds can be created just with air and the bellows? What happens to the sound when you half depress the air button? What about if you gently undulate your LH at the same time? And then maybe, after a while, you add one gentle, plaintive note with the RH. A meditation on the accordion.

Or for something different, you might decide to explore the aforementioned Eb harmonic minor scale. You could play a long Eb and Bb drone in the LH and slowly explore all the different sounds created by each note in the scale with the RH. Try different reed combinations and registers (high, low, middle of the keyboard). No need to worry about rhythm (unless you want to). You can take your time and, once again, simply enjoy the sound of your beautiful instrument as you connect with it in a way that is playful and creative. And remember; no judgement. As Alban Berg once said to George Gershwin: 'It's all music Mr Gershwin'.

# Maestro Don Quattrocchí

A checklist for piano accordionists:-

I have the pleasure to introduce you to Don Quattrocchi! Here we have an Australian, in Victoria, who has dedicated his whole life to the promotion of the accordion.

In the 70s Don had the largest music school in country Victoria, north of Melbourne. There were no accordion exams so he composed music for the Australian Guild of Music and Speech. He conducted orchestras for concerts and play-outs, adjudicated several music Eisteddfods, played accordion in cabaret bands and was a regular presenter on community radio.



On retirement, Don now enjoys writing arrangements of popular songs for the piano accordion (also perfect for keyboard and piano). He offers his arrangements on his website (*donquattrocchi.com*) free of charge to promote the accordion and assist people worldwide who would like to learn the accordion (with easy to intermediate arrangements).

All tunes are in .pdf format and are regularly being updated and new ones added. At the time of writing he has 454 tunes! (all with chord symbols). The songs are organised alphabetically and next to many of them is a red arrow which links you to an accordionist playing the melody for you! (including children, students and international accordionists). There is also a section called Videos which has more accordionists playing for you.

#### Alan Reekie Receives Award in 2021 Queen's Birthday Honours – New Zealand

Long-time supporter of accordion activities in New Zealand, Alan Reekie (pictured – Auckland) has been awarded the Queens Service Medal (QSM) by Queen Elizabeth II in her 2021 Birthday honours.

Announced on 7th June, 2021, Alan was bestowed this prestigious award for his contribution to Performing Arts Governance. Alan's children, **Lionel Reekie** and Carolyn both started accordion at an early age, and as they progressed through local accordion competitions throughout

their childhood, Alan began to take an active role volunteering with many of the various associations that created musical activities within the community.

**Lionel Reekie** subsequently went on to a career as an accordion performer, teacher conductor and adjudicator. Alan's QSM award is the culmination of a life-time of voluntary work for Performing Arts.

The Queens Service Medal will be presented at a ceremony to be held at Government House by Her Excellency, the Governor General of New Zealand on behalf of Her Majesty the Queen in November, 2021.
